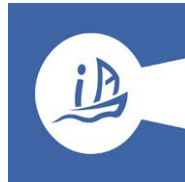

I Introduction

The Global China Dialogue series and GCD VIII

World in turmoil

The road to peace and development is strewn with numerous risks and challenges. The international system and order are in constant flux, and as part of that flux we are seeing profound shifts in the balance of power.

All countries, whether developing or developed, are having to adapt to this ever-shifting international and social environment, while the process of modernization in some countries has been interrupted or has spilled out to create global turmoil as a result of the conflicts and contradictions brought about by cultural, religious and social transformation.

At the same time, rapid developments in technology and society have had a profound impact on patterns of thinking, behaviour and interaction as well as on the moral principles of different countries and groups.

They have also constantly challenged established ideas of good governance, including the functions of government in the era of globalization and the pros and cons of the participation of non-government organizations.

The changes and challenges are myriad: digital technology, mobile communications and the popularization of the internet, the coexistence of cultural homogenization and diversity, ethnic and religious conflicts, the collision between giant multinational corporations and national sovereignty, changes in social norms as a result of scientific innovations, the decisive influence of regional economies on national economic development, the constraints of climate change and the discovery and adoption of new energy sources. Cultural diversity and transculturalism have become part of people's daily life.

Confronted with such challenges, national leaders devise development strategies that reflect both the status quo and their long-term goals. Business leaders and entrepreneurs also invest substantial resources in studying the impact of the changing international economy and financial order on the development of enterprises. Experts and scholars focus on the efficiency of global governance and cultural factors that have quietly exerted great influence, and explore how culture and ideology enhance global and social governance.

Such efforts and initiatives are moves in the same direction: towards reaching an in-depth understanding of the knowledge systems of the human community and the development of a 'global cultural sphere' beyond any single culture, state or nationality, under the condition of global governance. Thus, the theme of the development and governance of China, Europe and the world has gradually become one of the key research interests of scholars worldwide.

China in a changing world

China and the Chinese people are making an important contribution to the world order and are shaping global society. In this context we need to ask a series of questions. What are the important global issues that concern China? What are the Chinese ways of thinking and doing things with respect to global issues? We wish to engage Western audiences in dialogues on topics that arise from these questions, including development, education, economics, migration, the family, the environment, public health, human security and global governance.

For nearly three decades, China has been implementing a 'going out' (走出去) policy to encourage its enterprises to invest overseas. The policy embraces not only the economy but also finance, language, culture, sciences, technology, social sciences, publishing and the media, and under its provisions an international investment bank (亚投行) has been established.

Through his visits to 55 countries, President Xi Jinping himself has promoted the Belt and Road (B&R 一帶一路) regional development strategy and China's governance model (治国理政). In his recent visit to the UK, he said, 'As our capabilities grow, we shall shoulder more responsibilities to the best of our ability and contribute China's wisdom and strength to the world's economic growth and global governance.' In his

keynote speech at the United Nations Office in Geneva in January 2017, Xi Jinping clarified the basic principles of China's participation in global governance. They are: to stay committed to building a world of lasting peace through dialogue and consultation; build a world of common security and common prosperity through win-win cooperation; create an open and inclusive world through exchanges and mutual learning; and make our world clean and beautiful by pursuing green and low-carbon development.

In 2020, the COVID-19 virus emerged in Wuhan, China, and rapidly spread worldwide, having multifaceted impacts on both China and the world. These included a global public health crisis, leading to worldwide infections and deaths, with nations implementing lockdowns and social distancing measures. The debates over the origin of the virus and response strategies heightened tensions between some countries. The global economy suffered greatly, particularly in sectors like tourism, aviation, and hospitality, resulting in increased unemployment rates and altering people's work and life styles. However, the pandemic fostered the development of remote work and online education, accelerated medical technology advancements, especially in vaccines and medical equipment, and hastened the digital transformation in healthcare, education, and retail sectors.

Reflecting on the effects, the COVID-19 pandemic has been a substantial challenge for both China and the world, forcing a reconsideration of aspects like globalization, the public health system, economic development, and the way we engage in international cooperation

The Global China Dialogue series

The Global China Dialogues are a series of high-end forums centred on the concepts of 'transculturality' and social creativity, using China as a comparator or through interactions with the Chinese to explore and study global governance and advance the sustainable development of human society. In addition to universities, research institutions and professional think tanks, the GCDs also work closely with Chinese and other governments, international organizations, media and publishing units to track global hot topics over the long term.

The GCDs provide a high-end platform for the global public interests of China and Chinese participation in building a global society and the comprehensive governance of such a society. We embrace interdisciplinary, cross-professional, cross-industry, cross-border and international perspectives. Through open dialogues among academics, scholars, intellectuals, political and business leaders, industry elites, professionals and social activists, we address the challenges faced by today's world. Our goal is to identify solutions and reach a consensus or understanding.

The GCDs are an ongoing creative knowledge transfer activity, bringing Chinese and Western scholars and opinion leaders together to explore transculturality and cultural generativity, contributing to the development of a 'global cultural sphere' beyond any single culture, state or nationality. Not every contribution will be directly related to China or reflect intimate knowledge of China, but all will present a perspective on what could be China's role in global governance, comparing and contrasting China with theories, methods or measures that pertain in other countries and in the world.

The GCDs also develop the rules of 'civilized dialogue', encouraging both sides to listen to the other, understand cultural differences, respect local customs, accept different perspectives and acknowledge the common destiny of humanity. In particular, it explores new global governance, encompassing national governments, international organizations, multinational companies, NGOs and citizens, with a mission to build a harmonious, symbiosis-based shared human community.

The 8th Global China Dialogue (GCD VIII)

As the 10th anniversary (2013–2023) of the Global China Academy approaches, we are pleased to announce that the 8th Global China Dialogue forum – ‘Governance for Global Health’ – will be held at the British Academy on Friday, 8 December. The Reception and Dinner will be hosted at the Houses of Lords, in the UK Parliament that evening.

The Covid-19 pandemic of 2020 revealed many weaknesses in our health care systems and structures across the world, and showed that health is a challenge that requires global governance and cooperation. Other issues such as climate change, the global prevalence of noncommunicable diseases, inadequate access to healthcare services and the lack of health workers globally also show that the need for global co-operation to deal with transnational challenges has never been greater.

The theme of the 8th Global China Dialogue is ‘Governance for Global Health’. It will explore the challenges and opportunities for global health governance, especially in the Chinese context, given China’s ageing population, continued economic growth and desire to reimagine healthcare management and governance. The Healthy China 2030 strategy emphasizes the need to develop the health sector in China. Speakers: Professor Nora Colton and Professor HUANG Gang



Professor Nora Colton is the Director of the UCL Global Business School for Health (GBSH) and Professor of Leadership and Management for Healthcare. She has a background in health and development economics with extensive experience in change management and strategic leadership for healthcare. Her current research focus is on senior teams in healthcare organisations, where her research examines the relationship between senior leaders and organisational performance. She also supervises and teaches at the postgraduate level. She is a sought-after executive education trainer and event speaker with a focus on strategic leadership for healthcare. Before her current role, Professor Colton was the UCL Pro-Vice-Provost (Postgraduate Education) and Joint Director of Education at Moorfields Eye Hospital and UCL Institute of Ophthalmology. She has been a Professor of International Economics at Drew University, USA; Dean of Business and Deputy Vice Chancellor at University of East London (UEL), UK; and a visiting professor in the School of Public Administration at the University of Electronic Science and Technology (UESTC), Chengdu, China as well as the American University in Beirut (AUB), Lebanon. Professor Colton holds a doctorate from the University of Oxford, UK.

Topic: Global Governance and Health: Navigating the Complex Landscape

Abstract: This keynote examines the critical intersection of global governance and health. Global governance refers to the collective decision-making processes, institutions, and mechanisms that facilitate cooperation and coordination among nations to address global challenges. As our world becomes increasingly interconnected, addressing global health challenges requires collaborative efforts, shared responsibilities, and effective governance structures. This presentation explores the critical components of global governance in the context of health. Many of the challenges of today, such as pandemics, emerging diseases, and health inequalities require collective action if we are to make progress on addressing them. Innovation in healthcare with the use of technologies to meet the health demands of populations worldwide is at the forefront of global

Professor HUANG Gang, MD and PhD, is the inaugural president of Shanghai University of Medicine and Health Sciences, professor at Shanghai Jiao Tong University School of Medicine, and a doctoral supervisor. He currently serves as the Chairman of the Health Management Branch of the Shanghai Medical Association, Vice President of the Shanghai Physicians Association, Deputy Director of the Clinical Medicine Professional Accreditation Committee of the Ministry of Education of China, Chairman of the China Simulation Medical Education Alliance, and Chairman of the Intelligent Medical Health Committee of the Chinese Health Information and Big Data Society. He is also the President of the Asia and Oceania Federation of Nuclear Medicine and

Biology, among other roles. He has edited over 30 textbooks and monographs in both Chinese and English, published over 300 SCI-indexed papers in journals including *Sciences*, and has been selected for multiple years as an Elsevier Highly Cited Scholar in China. He holds more than 20 authorized patents and has received numerous awards including the National Science and Technology Progress Second Prize, the Huaxia Medical Science and Technology First Prize, and the Shanghai Medical Science and Technology First Prize, among over ten other awards 2008.

Topic: The Development of Healthy China in the Digital Era

Abstract: The era of ‘big health’ has arrived in China, encompassing everything from healthy diet and lifestyles to health education, psychosomatic healing, professional medical care, and industrial innovation. ‘Health’ has received significant attention and has formed a healthy ecosystem. Key points are as follows:

- 1) The big data system for health is continuously being perfected, effectively monitoring the trends in national health. Technologies such as artificial intelligence, cloud services, and mobile IoT have constructed a refined, full-cycle health management service system. The implementation of layered and graded nationwide health prevention and control management has promoted the evolution of the entire health ecosystem towards a new order.
- 2) The concept of value-based healthcare is guiding the future development direction of hospitals. By establishing closely integrated medical alliances, connecting medical insurance with commercial insurance, and streamlining various interest relationships, the referral system of these tightly integrated medical alliances achieves bidirectional referrals, enhancing primary healthcare services.
- 3) There is comprehensive advancement in smart clinical services, telemedicine, and MDT (multidisciplinary team) medical services, improving the homogeneity and fairness of healthcare.
- 4) Standards for smart healthcare and health management guide the entire lifecycle of health management, including smart medical services, smart public health management and services, smart health city industries, smart medical insurance services, and the culture and literacy of smart health cities.
- 5) The concept of ‘preventive health management’ is being promoted, actualizing the idea that ‘everyone is the primary person responsible for their own health’, forming a self-regulated and autonomous healthy lifestyle. This aims to reduce the incidence of diseases, delay the onset of diseases, and improve the quality of life. Encouraging public participation in a digital health management system, and integrating health into all policies, mobilizes the enthusiasm and creativity of the entire society. This furthers the momentum of build-

ing a healthy China, striving to realize the pattern of ‘government-led, social participation, family support, and personal responsibility’ in the practice of a healthy China.

Professor Jolene Skordis is Director of UCL’s Centre for Global Health Economics, Deputy Director of the Institute for Global Health and Vice Chair of the European Global Health Research Institutes Network. In earlier roles, Prof Sheikh was Director for Research and Policy at the Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI), New Delhi, and Principal Fellow at the University of Melbourne. He is a past Board Chair of Health Systems Global (2016-18), and has served as an advisor on health systems to WHO, the MRC UK, the DHSC UK, the European Commission, UNICEF, the Wellcome Trust, USAID, FCDO, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and to several universities and Ministries of Health.

Topic: Mixed health systems in Asia and the challenge of governance

Abstract: Asian health systems are increasingly ‘mixed’ across different intersecting axes, for instance: public-private, professional-lay, traditional-modern, and now also digital-nondigital. This mixed character has specific effects on health system performance, and creates unique challenges for governance. I will explore some of these challenges, and outline future directions for research and action.

Professor Gerald Bloom is a medical doctor and health system analyst based at the Institute of Development Studies in the UK. He has a special interest in the management of health sector reform in contexts of rapid social, economic and technological change. He has published widely on different aspects of China’s health system development and reform. Between 1996 and 2011 he played a number of roles as an advisor to two large-scale projects which tested options for rural health system reform in a number of provinces, funded jointly by the Government of China, the World Bank and DFID. More recently he was a member of a team that evaluated a project aimed at supporting China’s growing engagement in global health. His current research focuses on the implications of rapid developments in medical science and digital health for health

systems in low- and middle-income countries.

Topic: Interconnectedness and Competition in the Global Health System

Abstract: The response to covid has made a number of changes to global health systems evident. The first is the changing structure of global value chains for drugs and health-related technologies. On the one hand, several large middle-income countries are competing for an increasing share of global markets, while, on the other hand, there is a push to build the capacity for local production in many low- and middle-income countries. The second is the increasing perception that biomedical sciences and digital health are strategic technologies that will play important roles in the value chains of the future. This has been reflected in decisions to include this sector in national development strategies. The third is the demonstration of global interconnectedness illustrated by the rapid spread of the virus, of information relevant to the development of medical countermeasures and of disinformation. Strategies for global health governance need to take this context of intense competition and unavoidable interconnectedness into account.

Professor HOU Shengtian is Professor in the School of Management, Beijing University of Chinese Medicine. He is Director of the Health Industry Research Centre of the National Institute of Chinese Medicine Development and Strategy. Professor Hou's main research area covers health industry and management, global TCM development, medical and wellness tourism, hospital leadership and management. He is Editor-in-General of the *Blue Book Series of Health Economics and Management*. Dr. Hou is Chief Editor of *Blue Book of TCM: Annual Report on the Development of Global TCM*, *Blue Book of Global Health: Annual Report on the Development of World Traditional Medicine*, and *Blue Book of Forest Wellness*, *Blue Book of Health Sojourn*, *Blue Book of TCM Clinics* and etc. He is the leader of a research team which publishes China Health Tourism Destinations Development Index and China TCM Health Tourism Destinations Development Index.

Topic: Integration and Innovation: The Logic and Practice of China's Active Health Strategy in the Era of Population Ageing

Abstract: The global health governance system reflects the complexity and diversity of the global health efforts. The establishment of the World Health Organization (WHO) marks the beginning of global health cooperation and governance; In the early 1990s, the WHO proposed the concept of "health globalization", advocating for countries to jointly address global public health challenges through international cooperation and coordination. From focusing on infectious disease control and basic health services to chronic disease prevention and treatment, to today's diverse and comprehensive health issues, the framework for global health governance is becoming increasingly mature. With the advancement of technology, the acceleration of globalization, and people's attention to health and public health, health cooperation between countries has become closer and more efficient.

However, the challenges posed by the imbalance and inequality in global health cooperation, as well as changes in international political and economic situations, cannot be ignored for global health treatment. The cross-border spread of infectious diseases, effective prevention and control of chronic diseases, and slowing down the aging process are difficult but necessary issues. How to integrate the global health governance system, achieve cross regional cooperation, and seek common development through resource differences is a difficult but necessary issue. Aging has become a global issue, and addressing it cannot rely solely on the increase of modern hospitals, but requires a comprehensive response plan. Active health, through non-medical means, can not only reduce the increasing medical expenses, but also improve the efficiency of health investment. Modern medicine has always played an important role in addressing global health challenges.

However, relying solely on modern hospitals cannot fully solve the global health problems of the aging era, and traditional medicine must be fully utilized. China's ongoing efforts to actively and healthily address the challenges of aging by fully leveraging the role of traditional Chinese medicine are worthy of encouragement and in-depth research. The Chinese style proactive health response strategy and practice will not only be an innovative exploration for global health governance, but also have a role of 'leading, demonstrating, and driving'.

Dr. Jeng was invited by China's health authority to deliver his first international speech in Beijing China in October 2010 to promote his professional knowledge and experiences of higher education, R&D, vocational training in UCL, KCL and NHS from UK to China nationwide.

Peter is Vice President of global health, international higher education, green building and smart city cooperation at the UK Chinese Business Association, International Senior Adviser of Chinese Aging Well Association, Founder and Deputy President of the Hospital Construction Management Branch, Chinese Non-Government Medical Institutions Association. As a British multidisciplinary professional, Peter is one of the first senior NHS professionals integrating and connecting international business opportunities in higher education, hospital, care homes, architecture, urban development, life sciences and medical industries from the UK to China and extending the bilateral partnership in a global health perspective.

Since early 2010s, Peter had been invited by the government and healthcare authorities in Tanzania, Morocco, Saudi Arabia, India, Pakistan, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, Philippines, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Mainland China and South Korea to visit their universities, life sciences and medical institutions, and help them to develop international healthcare-related projects locally with China/UK/EU/USA based service partners in architecture design, urban planning, medical equipment and devices, ICT, AI and big data, education and training, R&D, hospital construction and operational management.

Topic: Integration and Cooperation: The Empirical Solution of Global Health Development

Abstract: The reason why I am involved with the development and cooperation of global health includes two key factors. First of all, it's because of my previous working experiences on managing and facilitating R&D projects and continuing medical education programme at NHS trusts in UK. Secondly, I was invited to join the British government and business delegation led by Prime Minister, David Cameron, to Beijing China in early December 2013 where he proposed Great Britain could lead British Commonwealth nations to cooperate together globally with the partnered nations of the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) led by China. Based on British PM's constructive and valuable advice at the UK-China government and commerce event in December 2013, therefore, I started to pay my own attention and get myself involved with more and more cooperative opportunities of global health in UK, China and other countries. There are several empirical cases what I would like to share as follows: (1) international cancer hospital in Tanzania (2014); (2) public general hospital in Morocco (2016); (3) public community hospital in Philippines (2019); (4) international supply chains and logistics of PPE goods and medical products (2020); (5) public general hospital in North Pakistan (2022).

A Former Marie-Curie fellow at the London School of Economics and visiting fellow at Tsinghua University (Beijing), laureate of the Institute of Advanced Studies of Columbia University (New York) and the Maison des Sciences de l'Homme (MSH-Paris), he taught or supervised masters and doctoral students at the School of Mines, HEC-Paris, at the Jawaharlal Nehru University of New Delhi and Rennes-II, at the Paris-Nord Economics Center, at the National School of Ponts et Chaussées in

France, directed the Center for Human Sciences (Ministry of Foreign Affairs-CNRS) in New Delhi. He wrote or co-edited eight books, including *Non-aligned Capitalisms* (Raisons d'Agir editions), a work nominated for the Le Monde-French Treasury prize.

Topic: Building the Tools of Global Health Governance: the Case of Coronavirus

Abstract: The coronavirus pandemic has highlighted the urgent need for global health governance. This presentation builds on a paper authored by Irina Bokova, Hakima El Haite, George Papandreou, and Joël Ruet, and argues for the implementation of global governance principles in health security. Health crises like the coronavirus are exacerbated by globalization, demographic movements, and climate change, necessitating a coordinated international response. This presentation suggests the perfection of big data systems for health to monitor trends and manage health security using existing global governance tools. It calls for political mobilization and the establishment of a global network of research centers to react swiftly to health crises. The necessity for a permanent, ring-fenced emergency fund, a global information sharing platform, and the immediate implementation of the 'WHO Academy' is also stressed. Ruet proposes a global approach to health crises, arguing that local containment strategies are insufficient, and advocates for a new model of health security that incorporates multilateral cooperation, sharing of information and resources, and the equitable distribution of vaccines. This approach is seen as essential to manage and mitigate the effects of future pandemics effectively. The presentation concludes that health crises like the coronavirus demand a rethinking of health security on a global scale, using advanced governance tools to ensure a coordinated, effective response. The coronavirus pandemic is presented as a case study demonstrating the necessity of this approach.

Professor Gao Jianhua Gao Jianhua is a professor with a lifetime appointment at the Southern Hospital of Southern Medical University. She is a leading academic figure in plastic and aesthetic surgery, a chief physician, holds a doctorate from Japan, and is a doctoral supervisor. She is an expert receiving a special government allowance from the State Council and a visiting professor at Nippon Medical School. She serves as the Vice President of the Chinese Society of Plastic and Aesthetic Surgery, Vice Chairman of the Chinese branch of the Pan-Asian Facial Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery Society, Honorary President of the Cosmetic and Plastic Surgeons Branch of the Chinese Medical Doctor Association, a member of the Degree Committee of the State Council, a reviewer for the Chinese Medical Science and Technology Award and the National Natural Science Foundation, and the deputy editor-in-chief of several journals, including the *Chinese Journal of Aesthetic Medicine*, *Chinese Journal of Plastic and Aesthetic Surgery*, and *Chinese Journal of Plastic Surgery*.

With 45 years of experience in plastic and aesthetic surgery, her skills are comprehensive. She specializes in various breast plastic surgeries and the treatment of complications, as well as comprehensive correction of lip and nasal deformities. She also has rich clinical experience in eye aesthetics, organ reconstruction, and repair of various defects and deformities, and has deep expertise in microsurgery and ultra-thin skin flap transplantation techniques. As the first (or corresponding) author, she has published over 200 papers (including over 70 SCI-indexed papers, 5 in Japanese, and 2 in Spanish). She has co-edited 4 major monographs and contributed to 5 others. She has trained 91 graduate students (48 masters and 43 doctorates), especially making significant breakthroughs and innovations in the genetic diagnosis and treatment of scar keloid fibroblasts, three-dimensional measurement and simulation design of breast plastic surgery, and adipose stem cells.



Dr LIAO Nong is Chief Physician, Plastic Surgery Department, The third Affiliated Hospital of Guangzhou Medical University, The second executive director of Anti-Aging Branch of Chinese Association of Plastic and Aesthetic Surgery, The second National Member of the Scar Group of the Professional Committee of Prosthetics and Reconstructive Surgery, Chinese Rehabilitation Medical Association. Graduated from the Graduate School of Southern Medical University in Guangdong Province, Dr Liao has previously undergone training at the Plastic Surgery Department of Shanghai Ninth People's Hospital and Beijing Plastic Surgery Hospital. She has also undertaken study visits to South Korea and Taiwan. With 40 years of experience in the field of

plastic and cosmetic surgery, she has served as the director of the department for 21 years, making her well-versed in a wide range of plastic and cosmetic techniques, especially good at eye beauty and fat filling technology, dealing with various complications. In the past 10 years, she has focused on cosmetic injection beauty and laser treatments, gaining extensive clinical experience in facial rejuvenation and anti-aging procedures. She has authored more than 20 academic papers and led two provincial research projects.

Topic: Challenges faced by the medical beauty industry

Abstract: Medical beauty industry has expanded globally, with particular prominence in the United States, Japan, South Korea. China as a rising star, has become the world's fastest growing medical beauty market. There is no doubt that medical beauty occupies the hottest track in the big health industry. The core meaning of medical beauty is healing, self-actualization and improving the quality of life. Medical beauty today has gained greater social awareness and open dialogue. In spite of this, there are still people around the world who do not accept or have no awareness of seeking medical beauty to solve their problems, or accept medical beauty but have not achieved the results they want, causing physical and mental damage. Medical beauty is developing rapidly, but its overtreatment is a big problem that medical beauty faces. From the perspective of China and the United States, this speech will discuss how the medical beauty industry should play an active role in health management, abandon existing problems, and develop in a healthy and orderly direction.

Professor YIN Weihai Professor Ying is a Professor of School of Biomedical Engineering and Associate Dean of Med-X Research Institute, Shanghai Jiao Tong University. He has been listed four times in the ranking of World Top 2% Scientists, listed twice in Elsevier Highly Cited Scholar. He has ranked top 30 scientists in China in the field of Neuroscience, Neurology and Neurosurgery, and Biomedical Engineering. His major research contributions include: First, he pioneered the study on the role of NAD in diseases; second, he established the ‘Pattern of Green Autofluorescence Theory’, which proposes that the green autofluorescence of the skin is a novel biomarker for evaluating the risk for developing certain diseases and for diagnosis of diseases; and third, he has developed a theory regarding the developmental strategy for health industry.

Topic: Challenge from an Ageing Society—The Urgency and Strategy of China’s Health Industry Development

Abstract: The rapid aging of the society around the world has produced severe challenges on human society. Since aging is one of the key risk factors of major diseases including stroke, it is expected that the health and happiness, the medical systems and economic systems of human society would face serious threats, if we could not block the continues increases in the number of patients of major diseases. The major goals of health industry include both prevention of diseases and promotion of rehabilitation. However, the health industry severely lacks systemic and scientific evaluation standards, key technologies and recuperation methods. There is also significant deficiencies in systemic and scientific developmental strategies for health industry. In this lecture, the basic developmental strategies for the health industry of China are proposed.

Dr Yuxi Zhang is an Assistant Professor in Health Policy and Systems at the UCL Global Business School for Health. Dr. Zhang earned her DPhil in Social Policy from Oxford. She also holds the position of Research Associate at the Oxford University Blavatnik School of Government. Her research focuses on the challenges faced by countries pursuing universal health coverage in the Global South. She also investigates policy innovations aimed at creating more equitable and human-centred health systems. In addition, her research related to COVID-19 sheds light on how health systems should incorporate early and decisive policy responses and build population trust to enhance defence against future pandemics. Her research outputs have been published

in respected journals, including *Governance*, *PLoS One*, *Nature Scientific Data*, *Royal Society Interface*, and various other places.

Dr. Zhang collaborates extensively on research with government authorities, including the National Health Commission of China and select committees of the House of Commons in the UK. She has provided consultancy services to various international organizations, such as the WHO-World Bank Global Preparedness Monitoring Board and UNFPA. Her opinions are sought after by major news outlets, including Bloomberg, the World Economic Forum, and China Daily.

Abstract: China’s healthcare reform has made laudable progress in the 21st Century. However, it also faces significant challenges shared with many other countries. This presentation discusses how research with a multi-disciplinary approach could improve our understanding of the challenges and opportunities in global health governance, highlighting the great relevance of the Chinese experience to the world.

On the one hand, China has impressed the world with the achievement of building a basic healthcare system covering the entire population. My research suggests that the social health insurance system has also improved the portability of reimbursement benefits for the vast domestic migrant population in recent years, demonstrating the system’s commitment to caring for the most disadvantaged. While poor insurance portability and cross-regional inequality are problems affecting many health systems in the Global South, governance innovations in China, such as building an advanced national digital insurance clearing and settlement platform, have demonstrated promise in addressing such "wicked problems" and weathering systemic shocks, such as a pandemic. On the other hand, while global evidence suggests a clear association between early and decisive COVID-19 policy measures and better epidemiological outcomes, we still know relatively little about the changing social-psychological landscape of the public, which presents a pressing challenge for policymakers in effectively adjusting human behaviour during a public health crisis. Drawing on analysis of big data and

survey data, my research has found early evidence for the uniqueness of a social trust pattern in China, and its commonality shared with other societies. Great research opportunities exist in using advanced data science to inform global health governance in the future.

Mr Charles Grant is the Founding Director of the Centre for European Reform since 1996. In January 1998 he left *The Economist* to become the CER's first – and so far only – director. He is the author of numerous CER reports, including *Russia, China and global governance* (2012), *How to build a modern European Union* (2013) and *Relaunching the EU* (2017). He works on, among other subjects, Britain's relationship with the EU, the future of the European Union, EU foreign policy, Russia and China. He is also a member of Board of GCA Trustees. After studying modern history at Cambridge University, Charles took a diploma in French politics at Grenoble University. Returning to London, Grant joined *Euromoney*, the financial magazine, in 1981.

He moved to *The Economist* in 1986, where he wrote about the City. In 1987 he began a series of articles which exposed the County NatWest-Blue Arrow scandal, which led to two Department of Trade and Industry inquiries and a long criminal trial. Charles was a director and trustee of the British Council from 2002 to 2008. He was a member of the international advisory board of the Moscow School of Political Studies (which became the Moscow School of Civic Education) from 2002 to 2015. He is a member of the international advisory boards of the Turkish think-tank EDAM, the French think-tank Terra Nova and the Italian think-tank Aspen Italia. He is on the advisory board of the Turkish think-tank EDAM, of the French think-tank Terra Nova and of the Italian think-tank Aspen Italia. He is a member of the Council of the Ditchley Foundation, of the advisory board of the UCL European Institute, of the Scottish First Minister's Standing Council on Europe, and of the Brexit Advisory Panel of Make UK (formerly the Engineering Employers' Federation). He is a member of Global China Academy Board of Trustees.

Elena Semino FAcSS FRSA is Professor of Linguistics and Verbal Art in the Department of Linguistics and English Language at Lancaster University, and Director of the ESRC Centre for Corpus Approaches to Social Science. She holds a Visiting Professorship at the University of Fuzhou in China. She is Associate Editor of the journal *Metaphor and Symbol*. She specializes in health communicational humanities, corpus linguistics, stylistics, and metaphor theory and analysis. She has (co-)authored over 110 academic publications, including papers in *Applied Linguistics*, *The International Journal of Corpus Linguistics*, *BMJ Supportive and Palliative Care* and *The Lancet*, and six monographs, including *Metaphor in Discourse* (Cambridge University Press,

2008), *Figurative Language, Genre and Register* (Cambridge University Press, 2013) and *Metaphor, Cancer and the End of Life* (Routledge, 2018). Her research has been funded by UK Research and Innovation, the British Academy, the National Institute for Health Research and the Wellcome Trust. She is Principal Investigator on the ESRC-funded project 'Questioning Vaccination Discourse: A Corpus-based Study'. She was Deputy Chair of the English Language and Literature sub-panel for the 2021 Research Excellence Framework. In the periods 2011-14 and 2015-18, she was Head of Lancaster University's Department of Linguistics and English Language, which is currently in the top 10 for Linguistics in the QS World University rankings.

Topic: Understanding and Addressing Vaccine Hesitancy

Abstract: The ESRC-funded project ‘Questioning Vaccination Discourse: A Corpus-Based Study’ (Quo VaDis) has employed computer-aided analyses of large language datasets to explore attitudes towards vaccinations in online interactions in English, and to propose linguistic strategies to address vaccine hesitancy. This talk summarises the project’s findings with regards to sources of vaccine hesitancy and introduces a study that has tested the use of metaphors to address some of these concerns.

Gavin is Associate Editor of the *International Journal of Corpus Linguistics* (John Benjamins) and Co-Editor of *Cambridge Elements in Critical Discourse Studies* (Cambridge University Press) and the *Corpus and Discourse book series* (Bloomsbury). Topic: Public communication about dementia: Identifying and challenging stigma

Abstract: Dementia represents one of the most pressing public health challenges of our time. There are around 55 million people living with dementia in the world today and this is expected to triple by 2050. Many people receiving a dementia diagnosis must not only live with the condition, but also with the stigma that surrounds it. Dementia stigma can negatively impact the lives of people living with dementia and their families in a wide range of ways, such as by creating feelings of shame and making them less likely to seek medical support and take part in research. In the UK, dementia stigma has also been found to distort service standards at all levels of healthcare, from funding decisions to service commissioning and frontline care. The way we talk and communicate about dementia, including our use of language and imagery, has the power to shape our attitudes towards it and, for people diagnosed with dementia, how it is experienced. Unfortunately, much communication about dementia in the public domain, such as in the media, is negative and sensationalistic, foregrounding its threat and presenting a dementia diagnosis as an effective death sentence. In this talk, I will report on findings from an ongoing project UKRI-funded project, ‘Public Discourses of Dementia’, which is exploring some of the ways in which language use can contribute to dementia stigma. Moreover, I will consider how changing how we talk about dementia might alleviate some of this stigma and help us to see the person before the syndrome.

Professor QIAN Yufang is a Professor at Zhejiang Gongshang University, School of Foreign Languages, serves as the Director of the Institute of Corpus Linguistics and Discourse Studies and is a Ph.D. supervisor. Her research interests encompass discourse studies, corpus linguistics, and related fields. With three published books to her credit, she has been recognized with the third prize for outstanding research achievements in the sixth National University Outstanding Research Achievements Award by the Ministry of Education. Additionally, she received the second prize for outstanding achievements in the 21st Zhejiang Provincial Philosophy and Social Sciences Award, as well as the second prize for outstanding achievements in the 17th Jiangsu Provincial Philosophy and Social Sciences Award.

Professor Qian has contributed over 30 papers to esteemed journals such as *Foreign Language Teaching and Research* and *Corpora*, both domestically and internationally. She has played leadership roles and actively participated in more than 10 national and provincial research projects. Currently, she leads a sub-project of a major national social science project, the Chinese Academic Translation project of the National Social Science Fund, and a significant cultural research project of Zhejiang Province.

Furthermore, Professor Qian serves as the co-chief editor of the Chinese Discourse Series by the Global Century Press in the UK, the editor-in-chief of the international journal *Corpus Approaches to Chinese Social Sciences*, the vice president of the Discourse Research Committee of the China Comparative Study of English and Chinese, and the executive director of the Corpus Translation Studies Committee. She has been honored with the title of Outstanding Teacher in Zhejiang Province.

Topic: Evolution of Traditional Chinese Medicine Discourse in British Newspapers: A Corpus-Based Diachronic Study

Abstract: This research explores the historical representation of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) in British newspapers, tracing its trajectory from the late 19th century to the present. Merging corpus methodologies and critical discourse analysis, the study examines how TCM discourse has evolved over more than a century, shedding light on changing perspectives in the United Kingdom. Early reports exhibited a mocking and doubtful tone, portraying TCM as an eccentric form of alternative medicine. However, as time progressed, some reports adopted a more neutral or positive perspective, suggesting potential therapeutic benefits. The study not only reflects the dissemination journey of TCM in the UK but also mirrors societal shifts in beliefs and values. It highlights a broader transformation from initial skepticism to a progressively positive reception of TCM, indicative of changing attitudes in British society towards diverse medical practices. In summary, British newspaper reporting on TCM has shifted from initial ridicule to reexamination and eventual recognition, echoing broader societal changes. The constructed discourse surrounding TCM has evolved, revealing a growing acknowledgment of its efficacy over time.

Research interests include Media Culture, Cross-cultural Communication, Communication Theory, History of the Idea of Communication. She published over a hundred research papers and the author of *Commercial Press and the Enlightenment of Modern Chinese Women* (2016) and *The Road to Mutual Understanding and the Stone from Other Mountains: A Study on the International Communication of Chinese Culture* (2023). She is editor or contributor to various series including 'Contemporary Media Theory from a Global Perspective' (2023), 'College Aesthetic Education' (2023), 'Media Criticism' (2018 to present), 'Ontology of Art' (2020), and 'Communication and Media Cultural Research Method' (2017), "Fifteen Lectures on Media Culture" (2017). She has led research projects funded by the National Social Science Fund of China, including 'BBC Documentary on China and the External Communication of Chinese Culture' and 'International Communication Research on Chinese Ritual Culture from the Perspective of Civilizational Interactions'.

Topic: Making Global and Local: Viruses as Media

Abstract: Undoubtedly, while we are increasingly concerned about globalization, we also place great importance on locality. Especially in the past few years, the virus attacks that humanity has collectively encountered have further strengthened the duality of global and local. On the one hand, virus makes humans are tightly connected, and on the other hand, it creates alienation. Whether it is an event involving global health or a “global village” created by media, humanity is wrapped in “goods” and “bads”. This study attempts to explore the role of viruses as a medium in removing boundaries between locations and regions from the perspective of communication, but the globalization they constitute is also fragile and tense. The construction of global and local relations may require more aspects of empathy, good will, and integration, in order to establish a more idealized order.

Topic: Supporting health engagement and co-creation

Abstract: My presentation will be centred on examination of co-creation practices within the healthcare sector, with a specific focus on their critical role in fostering improved health outcomes. In the sphere of healthcare, co-creation refers to the active involvement of individuals with a diverse array of products and services that possess the potential to facilitate and empower healthy behaviours. I will review personalized communication and engagement strategies that may be adopted by a range of stakeholders, including public entities, private organizations, and voluntary/charitable groups. These strategies hold the capacity to facilitate the co-creation of health-related initiatives. I will provide an illustrative framework demonstrating how the concept of health co-creation can be effectively mapped across various life stages and lived experiences. This analysis will also shed light on how these stakeholders can either enhance or impede an individual’s active participation in shaping their health-related experiences.

Simcha Jong is Professor Simcha Jong, Professor of Management and Healthcare Innovation, Director DBA Health programme, UCL Global Business School for Health, UK. Jong has held (visiting) faculty appointments at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, Leiden University, École Polytechnique, Luiss Business School, and University of Eastern Finland, as well as the UCL School of Management where he was an the Chair of the UCL Healthcare Management Initiative. Jong’s research focuses on the intersection of science, innovation, and health and he has published extensively on R&D organizations and innovation ecosystems in the life sciences. Jong currently leads an ERC Consolidator project, titled Addressing Global Challenges through

International Scientific Consortia (grant number 819533) on the management of international R&D consortia to address global challenges. Jong has a PhD in Social and Political Sciences from the European University Institute in Florence, Italy, an MPhil in Management Studies from the University of Cambridge (first class honours with distinction level), and a BA in Social Science from Utrecht University’s University College (cum laude). In addition, he was a visiting scholar at the Department of Sociology at UC Berkeley.

Topic: Capitalising on the health data gold mine: Using federated learning to engage China in the global health data space

Abstract: Data has also been referred to as the new ‘gold’. Yet, data itself is of little value. Value is created by collating and analysing data to create new insights that drive learning, innovation, and improved decision making. Unlocking the value of data to tackle global challenges, however, requires access to data and greater data sharing, within and across organisations, health systems, and national borders. Moreover, as the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted, significant barriers remain in the way of efforts to share the data that are needed to formulate and coordinate effective responses to disease outbreaks. Some of these barriers are technical in nature (e.g. compatibility issues between different health information systems, differences in

data standards); Other barriers are regulatory in nature (e.g. privacy, data protection and security issues). For example, UK, EU, and Chinese regulators impose significant restrictions on the movement of data outside national health data spaces. In this talk, I will discuss federated learning infrastructures as a solution to the challenge of greater data sharing that is needed to unlock the value of health data for health systems. Federated learning is a way to fuel data analytics and AI models without anyone actually seeing or touching data held locally. While data analytics traditionally is conducted on centralised servers, new more decentralised, federated models are emerging in which data does not need to be transferred from local to central servers. Accordingly, such models allow us to mitigate some of the barriers that are in the way of data sharing across organisational and national boundaries. In this presentation, I will present some examples from China and elsewhere that describe how health systems can use federated learning infrastructures to support and improve learning within and across different national health systems and will be key to integrating China into global health data spaces. I will also describe some of the challenges in building these infrastructures.

Topic: The Evolution of Health Governance in the Digital Health Space

Abstract: Health governance in digital health is integral to creating frameworks that ensures responsible, ethical, and effective deployment of innovative technologies. The multifaceted role of health governance encompasses key components such as data security, cost reimbursement, and tools safety, collectively shaping the trajectory of the digital health landscape. Data security is a cornerstone of health governance. As health systems increasingly rely on electronic platforms to store and exchange sensitive patient information, robust governance mechanisms are essential. These mechanisms involve establishing and enforcing strict standards for data encryption, access control, and secure storage. Governance frameworks should also address issues such as data ownership, consent, and the responsible use of health data to build and maintain public trust in digital health initiatives.

Tools safety, within the context of health governance, requires regulatory oversight to guarantee the safety and efficacy of digital health tools. Governance frameworks should encompass guidelines for the development, testing, and deployment of these tools. Continuous monitoring and evaluation are necessary to adapt to evolving technological landscapes, ensuring that digital health tools meet rigorous standards for accuracy, reliability, and user safety. Cost reimbursement is another critical facet of health governance in digital health. Governing bodies must navigate the delicate balance between encouraging innovation and ensuring equitable access to these technologies. Establishing transparent and fair reimbursement models is vital to incentivize the development of digital health solutions while preventing undue financial burden on healthcare systems and patients.

Health governance serves as a linchpin for fostering collaboration among diverse stakeholders, including government entities, healthcare providers, technology developers, and end-users. It provides a structured approach to navigate the complex ethical, legal, and social issues associated with digital health.

Yet, it also fosters the development of the healthcare industry, including advancements in digital healthcare and new technologies, offering ample opportunities for international exchange and collaboration.

Dr Dimitrios Kalogeropoulos is Chief Executive at the Global Health and Digital Innovation Foundation, UK, and Health Executive in Residence at the UCL Global Business School for Health. He holds a PhD in Artificial Intelligence in Medicine and has over 30 years of experience in the field of health governance in the digital space. Dr Kalogeropoulos pioneered the reciprocal scaling of AI research and applications to bridge population-level data gaps in global health systems in the early 1990s. Having worked as an expert with the World Bank, the WHO and PAHO, the European Commission, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, he has a 20-year track record in international development and global health and an instrumental role in developing open innovation ecosystems worldwide, from East to Central Asia, Europe and Central America. Dimitris received the recognition of Global AI Ambassador 2023, has contributed to policy think-tanks toward the EU AI Act, is Digital Health and AI Editor and Member of the IEEE European Public Policy Committee on ICT and a Member of the Working Group on Digital Health, Interoperability and Climate Policy at the Health Data Collaborative, initiative led by the World Health Organization. In 2015-16 he helped shape Policy for Deepening Health Reforms in China, now implemented as Healthy China 2030, participating in the China Joint Study Partnership with the World Bank Group, the WHO, and the Ministry of Finance, National Health and Family Planning Commission, and Ministry of Human Resources and Social Security. Dr Kalogeropoulos is the Founder and Chair of the IEEE Standards Association Healthcare and Life Sciences Workstream and Study Group on Secure, Compliant, Coordinated and Inclusive Healthcare Data Recycling, working for the development and adoption of standards for Open, Data-Coupled Global Health Innovation. Previously IBM, he has served on the board of advisors of start-ups and organizations in Europe and the U.S.A. He is a distinguished keynote speaker, Founding Officer and Chapter Organiser of the IEEE Engineering in Medicine and Biology Society Greece Chapter, a Member of the IEEE SA Planet Positive 2030 Initiative on Sustainable Infrastructures and Community Development, and Coach and Mentor in the Edison™ Accelerator program, facilitated by GE HealthCare, also mentoring several other healthcare and biosciences innovation initiatives.

Topic: A New Culture of Governance for an Inclusive Digital Future

Abstract: Technology has become an essential adjuvant for obtaining health care. Yet, people from historically marginalized populations continue to lack access and the skills to effectively engage with digital health. Efforts to harness digital health to equally benefit all people must include foundational capabilities such as data-connected innovation for patient-centered knowledge to manage the many risks in innovation delivery and to strengthen reciprocity in research and application for equitable outcomes. An inclusive, open, community-driven effort relying on telehealth to deliver sharable data that reflects the quality and continuity of care,

holds the potential to create platforms that empowers all users. Broader participation will fuel meaningful and actionable evidence-based policies. Fine-grained data representations underpin effective standards setting to translate innovations to new digital care delivery models; to address the information asymmetries undermining equitable outcomes and impact the quality and reliability of the evidence accessible, reinforcing the need for improving equity in universal health coverage. The lack of agility of health systems in responding to health challenges has led to digital technologies that exacerbate the problem of bias and exclusion due to underrepresentation of all communities in foundational datasets. The current new culture of transparent governance based on the adoption of industry standard, extends current regulatory and governance policies. It sets to communicate a shared vision about digital cooperation that promotes and enables the ambitious goals set in the past with inclusive and meaningful demand-side initiatives. The new governance culture departs from traditional internal, siloed and inward-looking business innovation perspectives, by progressively giving way to open, collaborative innovation and ecosystems that are inherently capable of creating socio-economic benefits for multiple stakeholders. Its benefits include shared value, shorter learning and translation cycles and dynamic spillovers that can greatly accelerate progress on the UN Sustainable Development Goals. Barriers from data localization policies impacting international data transfers must be lifted to enable true cooperation and especially across jurisdictions and in Low- and Middle-Income Countries and to extend standards and governance beyond healthcare that can respond to upcoming threats such as quality of care, climate change and future pandemics.

Professor Xiangqun Chang FRSA, FGCA and President of the Global China Academy (GCA), a UK-based independent worldwide fellowship that encourages comprehensive studies on China in the social sciences and humanities; she is Distinguished Professor at Nankai University and Honorary Professor at Jilin University. She was Honorary Professor at University College London (2015-20), a Professorial Research Associate at SOAS, University London, a Visiting Professor at University of Westminster, Senior Research Associate of LSE, and holder of several Professorships and Senior Fellowships at Peking, Renmin, Fudan and Sun Yat-sen University in China. Her academic publications amount to over three million words (in English and Chinese),

including *Guanxi or Li shang wanglai?: Reciprocity, social support networks and social creativity in a Chinese village* (Chinese 2009, English 2010).

As the only UK-based sociologist trained in both China and the UK, Xiangqun had been working at universities on social scientific studies of China interdisciplinarily since 1991, when she came to the UK as a Visiting Fellow. Based on her thorough and detailed ethnography of a Chinese village with longitudinal comparisons, and borrowing and adapting Chinese classical and popular usage of *li shang wanglai* (礼尚往来), she developed a general analytical concept – ‘reciprocity’ (*lishang-wanglai* 互适), the mechanism by which Chinese society and Chinese social relations operate, thereby contributing to existing theories of reciprocity, relatedness, social exchange, social creativity, social interaction, social networks, social capital and transculturality with characteristics of ‘ritual capital’ (礼仪资本), for understanding and governance of global society. She was selected by the Academic Presidents of the International Sociological Association (ISA) as one of 15 sociologists in the world who ‘called upon to adapt the discipline to the upheavals of the twenty-first century’ (see *Practicing Social Science: Sociologists and their Craft*, by Devorah Kalekin-Fishman, Routledge, 2017).

Xiangqun is also Editor-in-Chief of Global Century Press (GCP). Currently, she is in charge of publications of four academic journals and eight book series (in English and Chinese dual languages). She is Editor of the *Journal of China in Global and Comparative Perspectives*, ‘Chinese Concepts’, ‘Globalization of Chinese Social Sciences’, ‘China and Chinese in Comparative Perspectives’, ‘Transcultural Experiences with “Three Eyes”’ book series and ‘Global Chinese Dialogue Proceedings’.

Over the years, Mr. Fan has been committed to researching on translation and foreign discourse innovation. He has published nearly a hundred articles on translation and foreign discourse in many mainstream media, and his research results have won the Outstanding Contribution Award of China's national think tank.

Professor Martin Albrow FAcSS (PhD, University of Cambridge). Founding and Past Honorary President of Global China Academy. He held the Chair in Sociological Theory in the University of Wales in Cardiff before becoming Professor Emeritus in 1989. Since then, he has held visiting positions in numerous institutions, including the Eric Voegelin chair in Munich, and chairs in the London School of Economics, State University of New York, Stonybrook, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, Washington DC and the Beijing Foreign Studies University.

Currently, he is non-resident Senior Fellow at the Käte Hamburger Center for Advanced Studies 'Law as Culture', Bonn University. He was President and of the British Sociological Association, Editor of the journal *Sociology* and founding editor of *International Sociology*, Editor of the journal *Sociology* and founding Editor of *International Sociology*, the journal of the International Sociological Association. His first visit to China was in 1987 on an observational tour with the State Family Planning Commission and in recent years he has contributed to the annual Symposium on China Studies with the Academy of Social Sciences and the Ministry of Culture of the PRC.

His specialties include social theory, organization theory and Max Weber's thought, and he is internationally known for his pioneering work on globalization. His *The Global Age: State and Society beyond Modernity* (1996) won the European Amalfi Prize in 1997. Other books include *Bureaucracy* (1970), *Max Weber's Con-*

struction of Social Theory (1990), *Globalization, Knowledge and Society* (1990, ed. with E. King), the first book with the keyword ‘globalization’ in title (book reviewed by Roland Robertson, *Contemporary Sociology*, Vol. 21, No. 1, Jan. 1992), *Do Organizations Have Feelings?* (1997), *Sociology: The Basics* (1999), *Global Civil Society* (co-editor) in 2006/7, 2007/8 and 2011, *Global Age Essays on Social and Cultural Change* (2014), and *China’s Role in a Shared Human Future: Towards Theory for Global Leadership* (2018) and *China and the Shared Human Future: Exploring common values and goals* (2021).

He is a principal drafter of China’s ‘Green Standards for Elderly Care Buildings’ and Shanghai’s ‘Green Standards for Industrial and Storage Buildings,’ among other policies and regulations. He also initiated and organized the first and second ‘International Ecological Construction Mayors Summit,’ co-hosted by the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade and the Shanghai Municipal Government in 2007 and 2008, respectively, and received the ‘Top Ten Outstanding Contribution Awards of the Chinese Times’ for the second summit. Dr Qian holds several positions in various social and professional organizations both within and outside China. These include Honorary President of the China Association for International Cooperation and Development of Private Enterprises, Chairman of Shanghai Centenarian Mystery Cell Technology Group Co., Ltd., Chairman of Shanghai Warm China Hospital Management Group Co., Ltd., and Chairman of Quan Ke Medical Imaging (Guangzhou) Co., Ltd. In addition, he serves as a supervisor at the QIAN Xuesen College at Nanjing University of Science and Technology and Xi’an Jiaotong University. He is the Executive Vice President of the Shanghai QIAN Liu Culture Research Association. He has been a director of the China Literature and Art Foundation and an advisor to the People’s Government of Lin’an, Zhejiang Province. He also holds part-time positions in comprehensive medical care and health in Japan and medical technology and international relations in the United States. QIAN Zhenhua is dedicated to promoting multidimensional international cooperation at different levels among governments, enterprises, and NGOs of relevant countries. 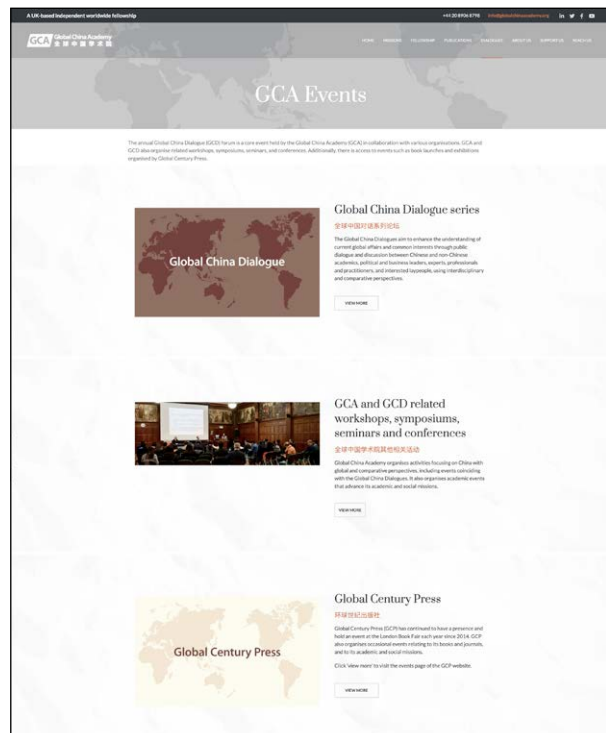


Events

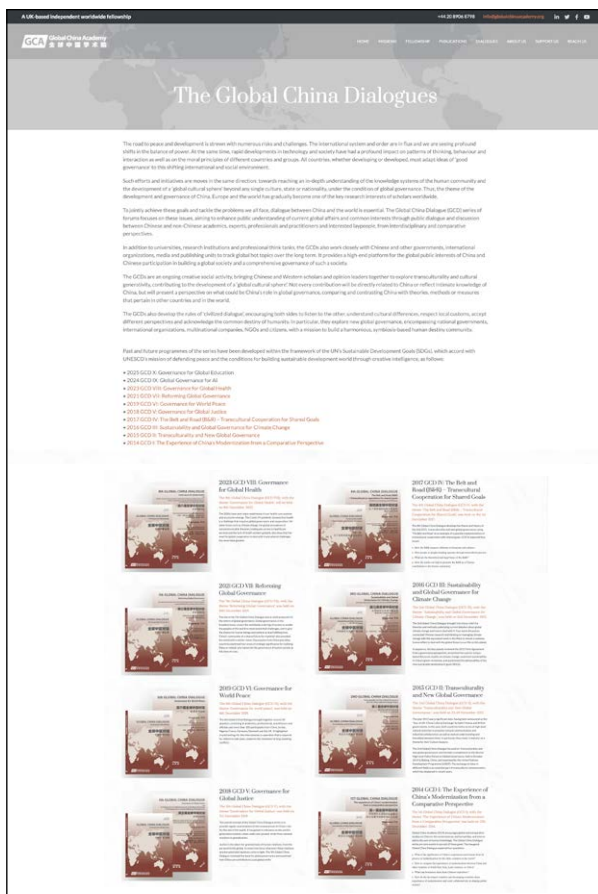

The Global China Dialogues

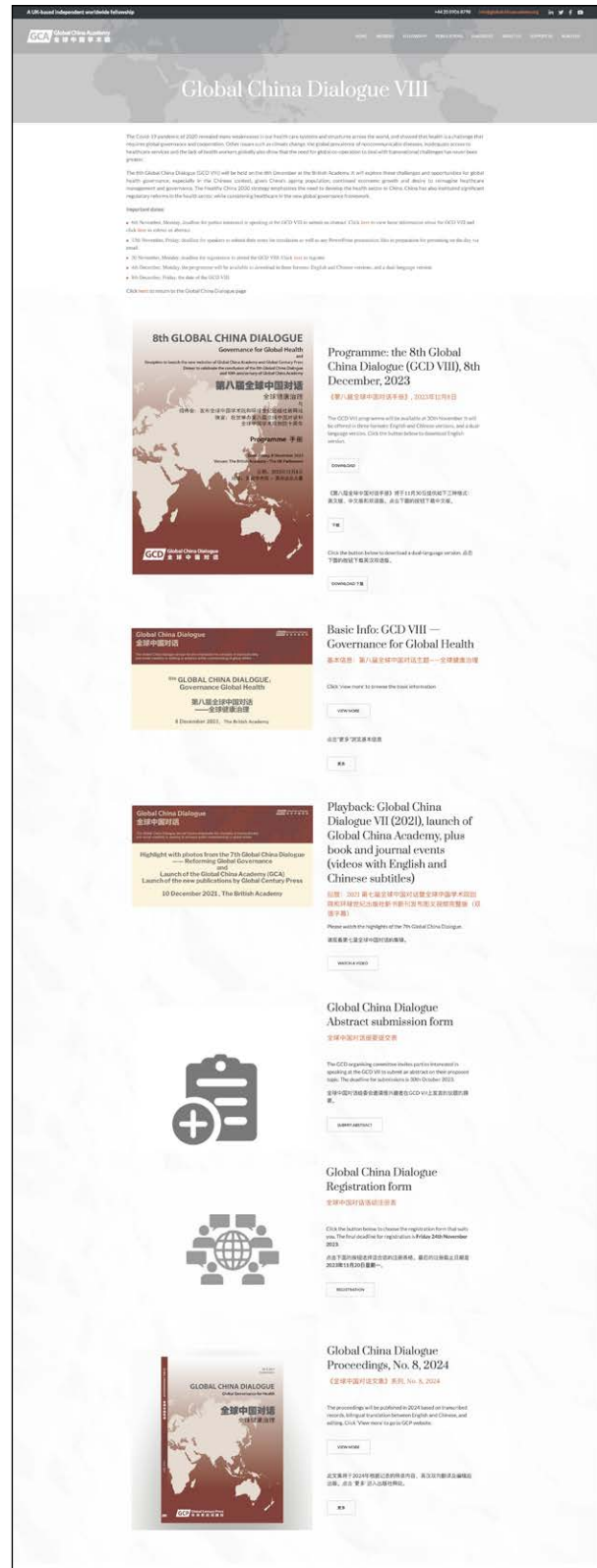

Global China Dialogue VII

The 7th Global China Dialogue (GCD VII), with the theme 'Reforming Global Governance', was held on 10th December 2021. Its aim was to yield proposals for the reform of global governance.

Global governance, in the broadest sense, covers the worldwide ordering of society to enable the peoples of the world to meet existential challenges, and to give the chance for human beings everywhere to lead fulfilling lives. China's 'community of a shared future for mankind' also provided the world with a similar vision. 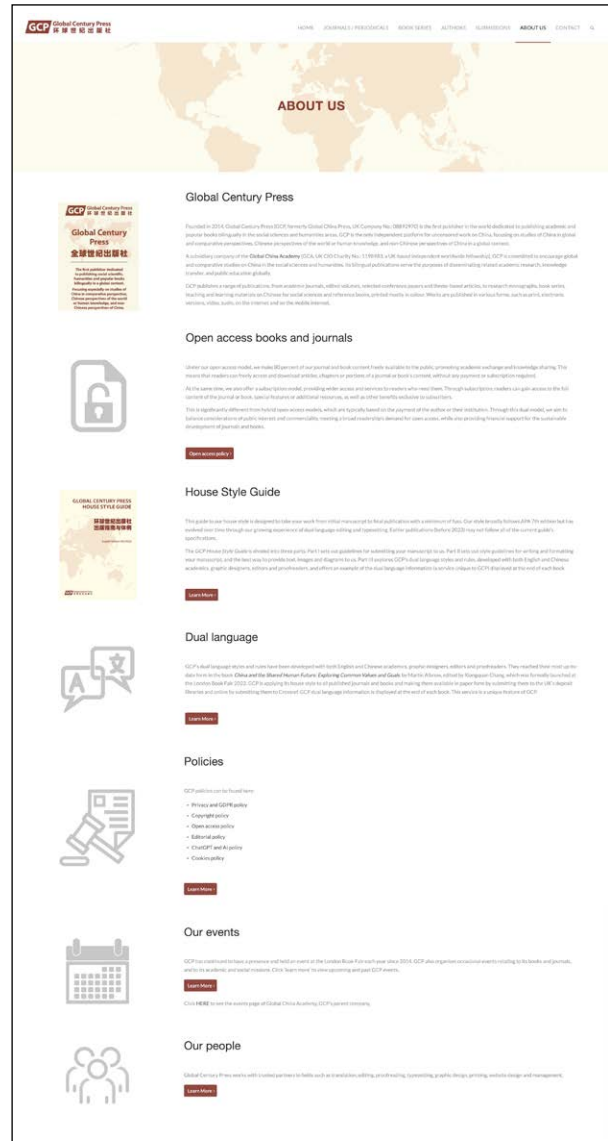
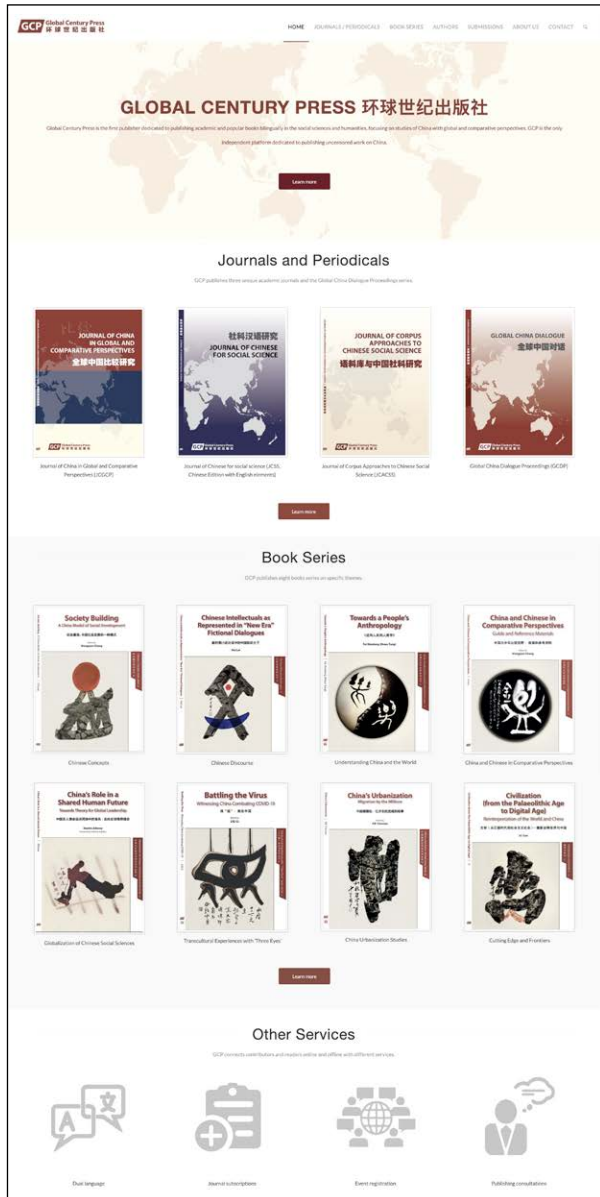
Founded in 2014, Global Century Press is the first publisher in the world dedicated to publishing academic and popular books bilingually in the social sciences and humanities areas. GCP is the only independent platform dedicated to publishing uncensored work on China, focusing on studies of China in global and comparative perspectives, Chinese perspectives of the world or human knowledge, and non-Chinese perspectives of China in a global context.

Open access books and journals

Under our open access model, we make 80 percent of our journal and book content freely available to the public, promoting academic exchange and knowledge sharing. This means that readers can freely access and download majority journal articles and book chapters, without any payment or subscription required.

At the same time, we also offer a subscription model, providing wider access and services to readers who need them. Through subscription, readers can gain access to the full content of the journal or book, special features or additional resources, as well as other benefits exclusive to subscribers.

This is significantly different from hybrid open-access models, which are typically based on the payment of the author or their institution. Through this dual model, we aim to balance considerations of public interest and commerciality, meeting a broad readership's demand for open access, while also providing financial support for the sustainable development of journals and books.

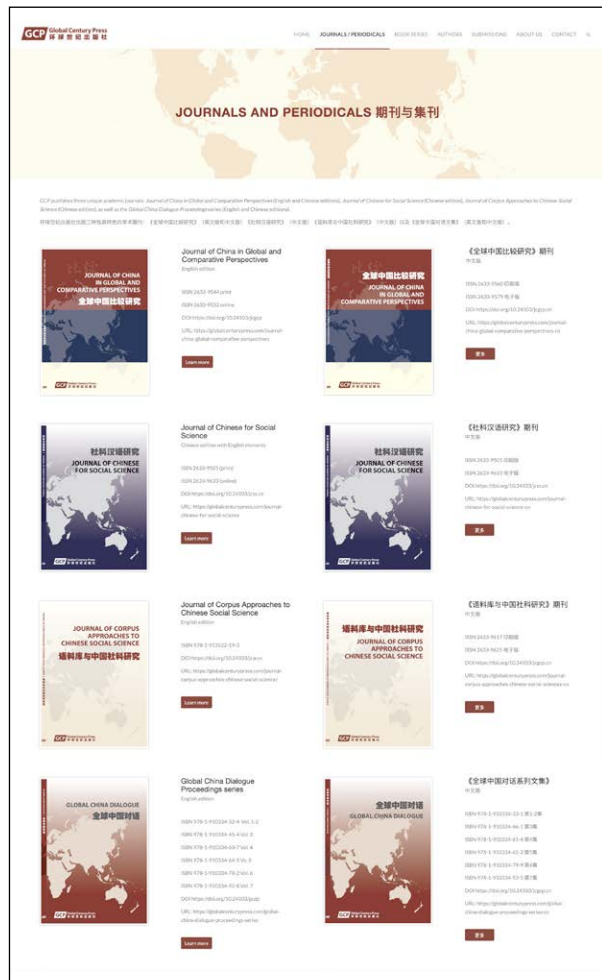
GCP submits all books and journals to the UK's deposit libraries. Each book and journal (including individual chapters and articles) is assigned a DOI (or Digital Object Identifier) reference and submitted to CrossRef, linking it to a permanent address on our website, to help readers easily locate a GCP publication from a citation.

Dual language publishing

GCP's dual language styles and rules have been developed with both English and Chinese academics, graphic designers, editors and proofreaders. Dual language information is provided at the end of each book. This service is a unique feature of GCP.

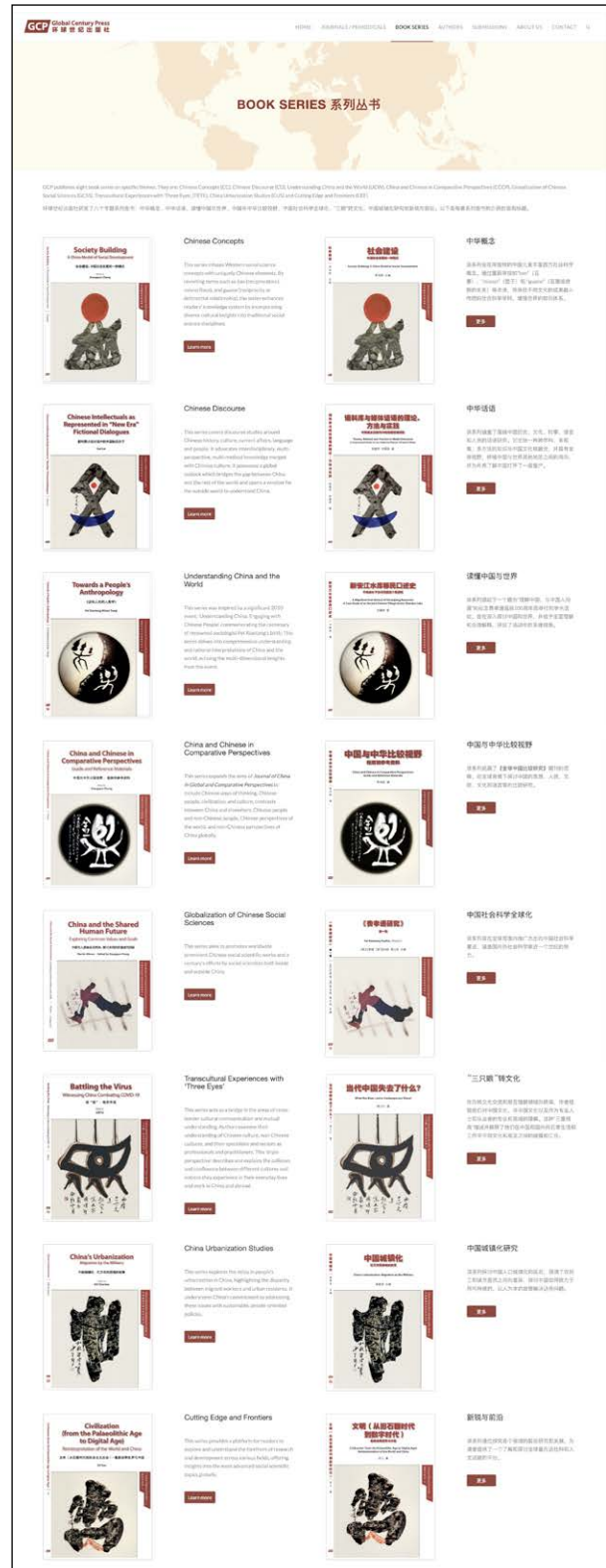
House Style

Our house style broadly follows APA 7th edition but has evolved over time through our growing experience of dual language editing and typesetting. The *GCP House Style Guide* can be downloaded from the website. It sets out submission guidelines, style guidelines for writing and formatting your manuscript, including how to provide text, images and diagrams, and explores GCP's dual language styles and rules.



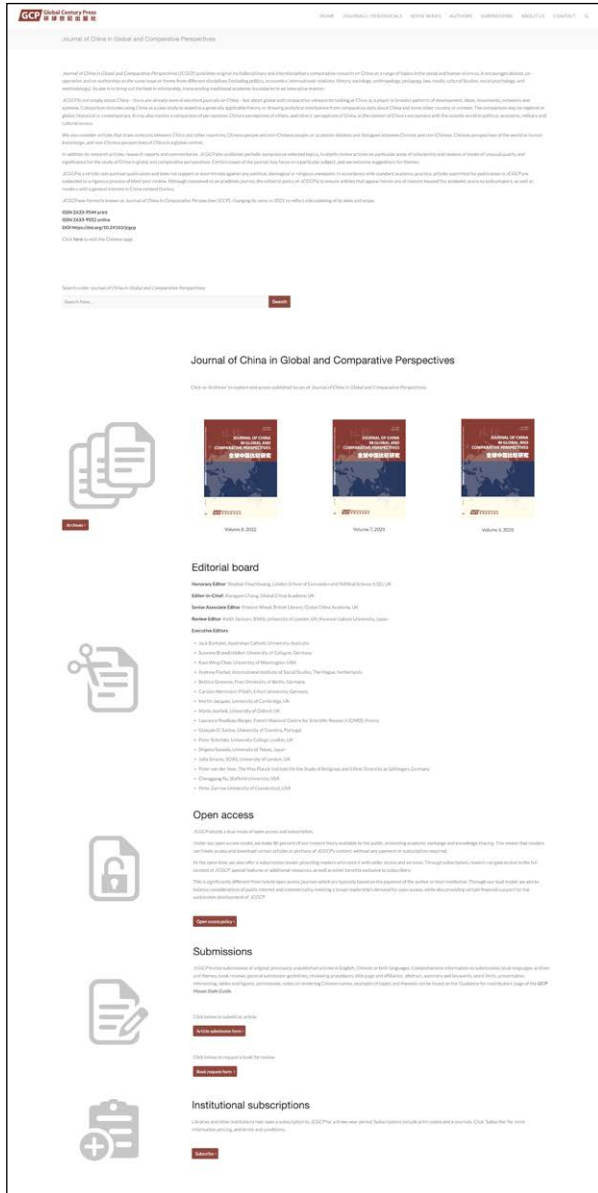
Browse or search

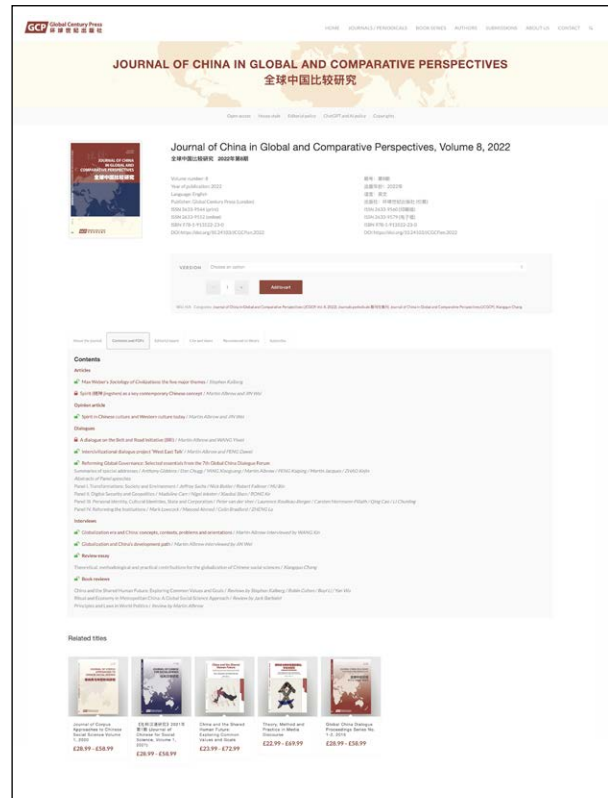
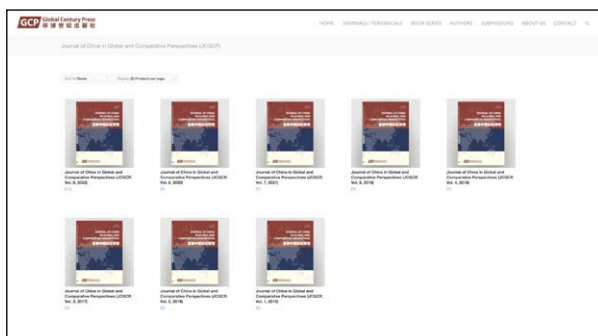


Journal home pages

Global China Academy (GCA) was registered with the Charity Commission as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO, Charity No. 1198983) in 2022. GCA was formerly known as CCPN Global and Global China Institute (Charity No. 1154640).

This year we celebrate our 10th anniversary!

Founded in 2013, Global China Academy has gone from strength to strength, overcoming many difficulties along the way but always expanding in its ambition and influence. Global China Academy is an independent fellowship with a social science focus on China and Chinese perspectives on the world and the outside world's perspectives on China and the Chinese. 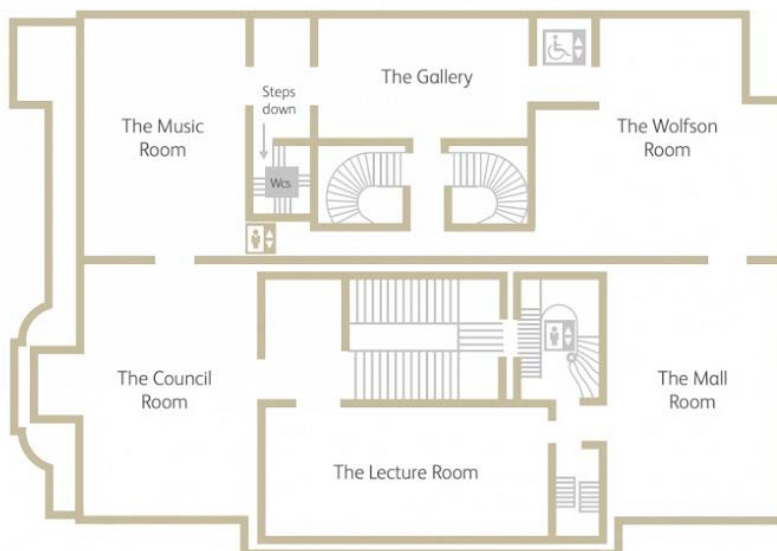

As the 10th anniversary (2013–2023) of the Global China Academy approaches, we are pleased to announce that the 8th Global China Dialogue forum—‘Governance for Global Health’—will be held at the British Academy on Friday, 8th December.

The Global China Dialogue Series is a high-end forum centred on the concepts of ‘transculturality’ and social creativity, using China as a comparator or through interactions with the Chinese to explore and study global governance and advance the sustainable development of human society. We embrace interdisciplinary, cross-professional, cross-industry, cross-border and international perspectives. Through open dialogues among academics, scholars, intellectuals, political and business leaders, industry elites, professionals and social activists, we address the challenges faced by today’s world. Our goal is to identify solutions and reach a consensus or understanding.

The Covid-19 pandemic of 2020 revealed many weaknesses in our health care systems and structures across the world, and showed that health is a challenge that requires global governance and cooperation. Other issues such as climate change, the global prevalence of noncommunicable diseases, inadequate access to healthcare services and the lack of health workers globally also show that the need for global co-operation to deal with transnational challenges has never been greater.

The theme of the 8th Global China Dialogue is ‘Governance for Global Health’. It will explore the challenges and opportunities for global health governance, especially in the Chinese context, given China’s ageing population, continued economic growth and desire to reimagine healthcare management and governance. The Healthy China 2030 strategy emphasizes the need to develop the health sector in China. China has also instituted significant regulatory reforms in the health sector, while considering healthcare in the new global governance framework. The GCD VIII include the following four panels:

- Panel 1 Global Health and System Integration
- Panel 2 The Challenges of Global Health Governance
- Panel 3 Communicating to Improve Global Health
- Panel 4 Health Governance in the Digital Space

全球中国对话系列是一个围绕“转文化”和社会创造为核心概念的高端论坛，以中国为参照系的比较视野，通过增进与中国同行的交流互动从而探索和研究全球治理、推进人类社会的可持续发展。我们鼓励跨学科，跨越专业，跨行业，以及跨国的全球视野，通过在学者、知识分子、政商领袖、专业与社会活动家之间开展开放的对话，旨在面对那些当今世界的重大挑战，找到解决问题的方案，形成共识、增进对彼此的了解。

2020年的新冠疫情大流行显露出当今世界在健康护理体系与结构方面存在着很多缺陷，同时也揭示出健康问题是亟需全球治理与合作的重大挑战。其他问题，比如气候变化、非传染性疾病的全球流行、健康护理服务供给的不均衡、以及健康从业者的全球性短缺，都说明这些跨国性的重大挑战需要全球合作来应对。

第八届全球中国对话的主题是“全球健康治理”。将要探索全球健康治理领域的机遇和挑战，尤其是考虑到在中国情境下，人口老龄化、持续的经济增长、对重新思考健康护理体系管理治理的需要。健康中国2030战略强调了在中国进一步发展健康产业的要求。中国也在推进健康领域重大的监管体系改革，同时兼顾到新的全球治理体系中思考健康护理。本届对话包括以下四个版块：

- 全球健康与系统整合
- 全球健康治理的挑战
- 沟通以增进全球健康
- 数字空间的健康治理
